Cody was a graduate of McKinney North High School and in 2009 he enlisted into the US Army as an infantry soldier. Cody died in combat in November of 2010.

I work with Cody's father, Chris Board, who is a graduate of West Point and a Combat Veteran of Dessert Storm. I was fortunate enough to get status reports about Cody's journey through Basic Training and shared in his father's concern when he was eventually deployed to Afghanistan in 2010. Chris and I have both served in combat and there was no need for us to belabor the dangers of being in a war zone, but the concern was always there under the surface as we talked about where Cody's unit was at and when he would eventually come home. Unfortunately, Cody paid the ultimate sacrifice when his Stryker vehicle was hit by an IED days before his 20th birthday. The tragedy of losing a child is something that no parent should have to face but Chris and Melissa did so with courage and the knowledge that their son was a brave and dedicated soldier, doing his duty to the very end. Chris has two other sons, both getting ready to serve as officers in the US Army which exemplifies the unquestionable patriotism of this family.

While naming a park after Cody will not bring him back, it will be a lasting testament to his courage and selflessness that others can venerate and emulate. When McKinney residence go and enjoy the newest of the many parks in our city, they will know that it is named after a hometown hero who gave his own life so that others can enjoy their freedom.

The Jaycees leased the building for \$1/year from the Texas Textile Foundation and allowed the citizens and youth of this city to enjoy community activities. It was for this effort, George was recognized as "Citizen of the Year" in 1954 because of his energy, his enthusiasm and his vision.

He owned North Side Pharmacy for 50+ years. Through the pharmacy he was able to help many youth pursue careers whether it was through employment or just encouragement. George served in many leadership roles such as President of Jaycees, president of the junior chamber of commerce, the 1st president of the Downtown Improvement Association, served six years on the MISD board, board of directors of Holy Family School, served as a member of the City Traffic Commission, Parks and Recreations Board, the downtown merchants, McKinney Rotary Club, First United Methodist Church trustees.

George Webb was not only involved in community activities but he was involved in the Texas Pharmacy Association where he served as President and was also recognized as "Pharmacist of the Year" by the state association.

In the 65 years that George Webb has lived in McKinney, he has been the recipient of " Citizen of the Year" in 1954 and then again in 2005, he has received the MCDC Quality of Life award in 2007.

- As a McKinney kid in the 70's, I spent countless nights at city ballparks, mostly Mouzon Park, watching
 my brother and friends play ball. Over the years, the teams changed, but one thing stayed the same:
 Grady Littlejohn. It is no exaggeration to say that I still remember the smells and taste of snocones,
 bubble gum, and hot dogs. Grady Littlejohn was ALWAYS there. By naming a ballpark after him, he will
 continue to "be there" for other McKinney kids.

- He gave his life to the concession stands
- The name Grady Littlejohn fields will be a great name due to Grady being a wonderful influence to many boys & girls from t-ball age to 18.. He was always looking out for us all and a great leader for many..
- In 1955 my dad, Grady Littlejohn, got permission from the City of McKinney to start a Girls Softball Little League, as there was only a Boys Baseball League in McKinney at the time. Permission was granted to him, if he would be responsible for securing coaches. There was no funding available, so dad set the league up at his own expense. The only field the city had available for use at the time for the new league was a field without lights (we played day games on Saturday) located on the grounds of the JC Center, on McDonald at the South end of town. There were no concession stand or rest rooms. Dad recruited coaches and assistant coaches, and they met at our house, Since I was in elementary school at the time, I don't remember many of the coaches names, except Art McNeil, W.D. Duckworth and Freddy Hackney. I do remember them making brackets and dad the coaches making an enrollment form for Girls Softball that was placed in all the elementary and junior high schools. I remember dad and the other volunteer coaches placing all the completed forms in a container and drawing out forms to form their separate teams.

My friends and I had a great time playing summer ball. I played for 7 years. We had no uniforms, and volunteer umpires, such as Dr. Marshall Searcy. What fun the girls of McKinney had playing ball, thanks to my dad, Grady Littlejohn.

Later, after I was grown, Dad applied for and won the contract to furnish concessions for the ball parks of McKinney. He won that contract and renewal contracts. He did this for over 20 years, until he retired.

Mayor Ben Whisenant declared one lovely summer day Grady Littlejohn Day in McKinney, in recognition of his life long service to little league in McKinney.

Grady Littlejohn is deceased. I can think of no one more deserving of having a McKinney park named after him; he would have been so proud to be honored in this way.

• Grady Littlejohn is the person I think if when Girl's Softball or Boy's Baseball is mentioned.

I still remember him at EVERY GAME in East McKinney when I was a kid. Good man! Meant a lot to all kids and their parents. All of my nephews and cousins played for Grady.

- I grew up in McKinney in my youth and young adult days. Grady was always there for all the ball players
 when I was a child playing baseball. He was devoted and worked hard for the youth of McKinney. He
 gave his time and thoughtfulness to all of us kids back then and made sure we had a safe clean place to
 play ball. It would be an honor to name this field after him and maybe some of the young today could
 learn about how Grady gave his devotion for the kids of McKinney.
- There is not enough room in this box to type why Grady Littlejohn's name should be used to name a park. My first meeting with Grady was at Mouzon Ballpark concession stand, where I went to get my post game drink. From that point on he made a significant impact on my life and many other childrens lives. As a youngster and as an adult I worked for Grady in the concession stands. He is/was a loving, giving, humorous man that loved everyone and gave 200% in anything he did. He was and still is respected as Great man with a Big heart.
- Because he was forever making sure everyone was able to eat before and after games. As Coaches and Parents sometimes we didn't have time to make breakfast. He always had what we liked to eat. He was a good man.

- It was my privilege to have worked with Grady Littlejohn while serving as Director of Parks & Recreation for the City of McKinney from 1984 to 2001. During this time period Grady managed and operated the parks concessions stands for the McKinney Parks & Recreation Department. However, Grady's commitment to the youth of McKinney began in 1955 when he initiated the formation of the Girls Softball leagues at Mouzon Park in east McKinney. Grady's dedication and commitment played a major rote in the growth and expansion on not only girls softball association, youth soccer and boy's baseball. Later on Grady became the concessionaire and operated concession stands at Mouzon, North Park, Town Lake and the Wilson Creek Soccer Complexes for over 30 years. I have witnessed on many occasions where a child who did not have enough money for a soft drink or piece on candy. Grady would make sure that these children would walk away with a soft drink or a piece of candy. Grady and his assistant Kim (Flip) Phillips dedicated many years of service by serving on the Girls Softball Association Board of Directors. Grady's continued support allowed for the expansion and increased quality of the Girls Softball Association. While operating the parks concession stands Grady hired hundreds of McKinney youth and gave them their first job experience working as a concession stand employee. Grady loved the City of McKinney and worked hard to provide children and their parents with quality concession services. I am honored to present my recommendation to the City of McKinney and to give honor and recognition to one of McKinney's most dedicated citizens.
- I spent many many hours at the baseball parks and soccer fields growing up. Grady Littlejohn and his concession stand was always there. He was a great supporter of the youth sports programs and their families. Mouzon Park was empty when Grady wasn't there.

I worked for Grady for many years. I remember a man who would stop by Mouzon at the end of the night. Grady would send him home with hot dogs, chili, cheese, and chips. He would only say, "sometimes good people need a little help." He was always giving to the park visitors.

The name Odle has always been a prominent, well known and respected name throughout Collin County. Odle Taxi was a very important business throughout the county in the forties, fifties and sixties. Joe Odle worked the business for many years. He and his nephew Charles Jones owned a shop in downtown McKinney called The Second Time Around. He also ran an auction in Collin County for many years. He was well known as a country and western singer throughout Collin County. He played every Saturday night on the Big D Jamboree in Dallas and recorded 2 records in Nashville. Aqua Velvet Gown and Little Pink Elephants. But the one thing he will always be remembered for is the fastest softball pitcher in Collin County. He played on a semi-pro team in the forties and played with the East McKinney Christian Church for many years as their pitcher. He has 3 sons Darrell, Ronnie and Brett Odle. He coached little league throughout their whole lives and made a big difference in the lives of many young boys like Gabe Nesbit, Danny Spears and Jerry Mckinney just to name few. He coached all of his grandsons as well. Joe was very dedicated and loved sports.He coached all 3 sons even until adult hood. He coached them until his health began to fail him in the mid-nineties. Joe was a supervisor at the City of McKinney Water Dept for many years and also worked as an electrician at the North Texas Water District until his retirement.

Mack Moran Hill, MD

I would like to nominate my father, Dr. Mack Moran Hill, as a candidate to have a park or public facility named in his honor. He has spent his life contributing to the city of McKinney, and I believe it is time for the city of McKinney to honor him.

Mack is a fifth generation McKinney-ite, and is a direct descendent of some of McKinney's founding families, the Graves, the Hill's and the Bushes. He has lived here for 89 years except for time away at school and the military. He grew up in McKinney and graduated from the old Boyd High School. For college, he attended TCU which also has McKinney roots. He was in his second year at TCU when the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor. There was a great need for doctors so he joined the Navy and attended Baylor Medical School in Houston graduating at the age of 23.

After an internship in Fort Worth, he served in Guam, and then joined the USS Piedmont, AD 17 in Manila. Ten days later, this vessel became part of the 7th fleet that President Truman ordered to guard the Straits of Formosa. Later, while he was stationed in California, he met the love of his life, Anne Wilks. They married, and his final assignment in the Navy was at Fort Campbell, KY. Their first child, Martha, was born there. And it was there, he decided to specialize in pediatrics.

Mack enrolled at UT Southwestern in Dallas to complete his residency. Their second child, Ben was born during that time. With such deep roots and extensive family in McKinney, it was natural that he and Anne decided to return to McKinney to open a private practice. There wasn't a single pediatrician in Collin County much less McKinney at the time, and he really felt he could serve the health needs of the children. Antibiotics and vaccinations were still in the infancy stage of development and unheard of in many rural areas. He would make a difference.

After opening the doors in an office where the new McKinney Public Library now stands downtown, very few patients dropped in for an appointment. Mack, concerned, consulted his good friend and pharmacist, George Webb, as to what might be the problem. George suggested he change his sign from "Pediatrician"• to doctor for "Children and Infants".• After all, nobody really knew what the term pediatrician meant since there had never been one. Once the sign was changed, there was never an empty seat in the office waiting area again. The rest is history. Dr. Hill operated an enormously successful pediatric practice for the next 25 years.

Times were certainly different. Independent labs didn't exist. House calls weren't a daily part of the routine, but they certainly weren't uncommon if there was a need. People rarely had health insurance, and if they did, they filed their own claims. The county or city would occasionally bring an inmate to his residence if there was an emergency after hours. No one was ever turned away..ever. Payment was sometimes something straight from the garden. And everyone knew that if Dr. Hill wasn't at the office, they could call him at home no matter what the hour. He would answer.

In addition to serving the children of Collin County, Dr. Hill has served the community. He was the city and county health officer for many years. He served on the McKinney Independent School Board

for 9 years.

He retired from practice in 1981, but that did not mean he would slow down. He has continued to serve in numerous community volunteer organizations and boards including his beloved First Christian Church where he has served as an elder, sung in the choir, taught Sunday school and served on the board. In 1993, he was named McKinney Chamber's "Citizen of the Year". In 2007, he was awarded the McKinney Community Development "Quality of Life Award". He has also served on the McKinney Boys & Girls Club board as well as the Red Cross.

He has served on the Pecan Grove Cemetery Board, the Chestnut Square Board in addition to the Collin Fannin Medical Association, as he did for many years. Over the years, he has been involved in McKinney Community Theatre and he in recent years participated in McKinney Summer Musicals. He is an active, long time member of both McKinney Kiwanas and McKinney Rotary Club.

Mack lovingly maintains and lives in the house his grandmother built in the historic district. It was originally the sight of the coral for the stagecoach to Sherman.

Dr. Hill was so connected to his patients, that even today, 34 years since he retired, former patients will stop him on the street and say "Hi Dr. Hill, remember me?".• What a wonderful legacy!

Since Dr Hill's life was dedicated to children, I thought it would be most fitting and appropriate if a park and /or playground be named in his honor. I appreciate your consideration.

Richard & Agnes Coughlin Park

After serving in World War II and earning a Purple Heart in the Navy, Richard "Dick" Coughlin was hired to be the hospital administrator for Wysong Hospital, and his wife, Agnes, served as Head Nurse at the Wysong Nursing Center, where she cared for many generations of McKinney residents during her tenure. The Coughlins moved to McKinney from New York with two kids in the 1960s. Coughlin's civic involvement included serving on TMLs legislative committee, chairing the City's budget committee, and membership on the Board of Directors of the McKinney Industrial Foundation. Later, he was elected to the City Council and served as both Mayor Pro-tem and as Mayor during the 1970s and 1980s. Coughlin's leadership was instrumental during McKinney's initial growth years. He was most known for being an early advocate of quality growth west of US 75 when many at the time were resistant to the idea, and he also was a fearless champion of the McKinney airport. Richard passed in 2001, and his wife, Agnes (91 years), resides in McKinney near the Eldorado Country Club. Coughlin's legacy is one of quality westward expansion, being a proponent of economic prosperity and growth, a deep commitment to public service, and always encouraging McKinney to plan for the future, which is why the new park in Westridge (one of McKinney's most westward parks) is fitting and appropriate to be named after Richard & Agnes Coughlin.
