I. Applying Organization

Describe the mission, strategic goals and objectives, scope of services, day to day operations and number of paid staff and volunteers.

The Samaritan Inn's mission statement reads..."We are a comprehensive homeless program that helps willing people gain dignity and independence."

The Samaritan Inn was founded in 1984 by the Collin County Ministerial Alliance and has expanded from a ten bed overnight shelter to a fully comprehensive homeless program and a national model that serves over 600 unduplicated Collin County residents annually.

The Samaritan Inn is known on a state wide level as a "Best Practices" program that regularly provides the skills, counseling, and opportunities for people to regain their independence. Our continuum of services includes prevention, assessment, counseling, education, and vocational and professional training.

During the course of The Samaritan Inn's history, a variety of other homeless programs in the county have become available, but their scope is narrowly defined to youth, victims of domestic violence, and/or women only. The Samaritan Inn provides services to all of those groups and regularly house infants through senior citizens, single-parent families, and veterans.

The Samaritan Inn is more than just a shelter for the homeless; it is a "Transitional Residential Shelter Program" in which the average length of stay for residents is over six months. Prior to entry into the program each resident has a background check (for any charges involving aggressive behavior) and a drug screen. A complete bio-psycho-social is done within the first few days of their arrival, which is used to help develop an individualized treatment plan done by the resident and caseworker. The development of this plan includes the resident's participation in many of the following classes/services:

- Money management The Inn has an eight-week program, developed by renowned personal money management expert Dave Ramsey.
- Household Management
- Welfare and legal advocacy
- Parenting education This class is mandatory for all the parents who reside at the Inn.
- Job readiness counseling This class is mandatory for all adult residents.
- **Job search assistance** The Inn's computer lab provides computer resources for our residents to prepare resumes, search jobs online, and hone computer skills needed for employment
- Enrollment on job training programs
- Enrollment in educational programs The Samaritan Inn has computer classes that teach our residents the fundamental skills for working with Word, Excel, and PowerPoint programs.
- **GED classes** tutoring and materials to prepare our residents to take the GED exam. This is mandatory for all adults 26 years of age or younger. It is optional for those 27 and older.
- **Health care referrals and monitoring** The Samaritan Inn and PrimaCare have an MOU to work together on meeting the medical needs of the residents. The Samaritan Inn also has an MOU with

Texas Star Pharmacy (TSP).

- Mental health care referral and monitoring
- Intervention in an prevention of family violence
- Intervention in and prevention of substance abuse
- Adolescents Alcohol Awareness classes which are certified by the State of Texas.
- **Collin College** to provide scholarships for those residents who qualify and have long range goals of a college education.

Each resident is assigned to a caseworker who together develops an individualized "program plan." It is during the development of this plan that any special needs by the resident are identified. If these needs cannot be met within The Samaritan Inn's program then referrals and links are put in place with other community service providers to meet these special needs.

The total number of staff employed by the Inn is 46, with 38 being full time and 8 being part time. Volunteers are an integral part of the Samaritan Inn's success. Currently, the Inn has over 80 volunteers who help in all aspects of the day to day operations. The Inn also receives a tremendous amount of Volunteer support for the Faith-based community and many other individual, community and cooperate organizations. Several Fortune 500 businesses located in the county have already pledged their support to the project with volunteer assistance. We also expect them to play a major role in our capital campaign.

Disclose and summarize any significant, planned organizational changes and describe their potential impact on the Project/Promotion/Community Event for which funds are requested.

This project will have little impact on The Samaritan Inn's organizational "management" structure. However, through this expansion the project will provide employment opportunities (non-administrative) to the local community such as cooks, caseworkers, program specialist (direct care staff) and more importantly, will provide services for those families that are currently homeless in our community. Upon completion, this part of the project (Phase I) will have an immediate impact on homeless families by allowing 100 families (avg. 300 people) to come into the Inn' services and off the streets.

II. Project or Promotion/Community Event (whichever is applicable)

Outline details of the Project/Promotion/Community Event for which funds are requested. Include information regarding scope, goals, objectives, target audience.

In 2013, the Collin County Homeless Coalition conducted their annual homeless count and found that homeless in Collin County had increased by 44% as compared to 2012. The Samaritan Inn has seen this first hand. In 2013, The Samaritan Inn turned away 3,754 (unduplicated and qualified) people because we were at constant capacity. The coalition also found that family homelessness accounted for a 50% increase. The Inn has also seen this same trend with families being the largest group in need of shelter care and, unfortunately, being the largest group to be turned away.

To meet the ever increasing need, The Samaritan Inn Board of Directors unanimously voted to purchase 15 acres of land a quarter of a mile from our current facility. The McKinney City Council unanimously approved the necessary re-zoning at their February, 2013 meeting and the purchase was completed on May 14, 2013.

The land will be used as the site for a state of the art family shelter. This will be achieved by construction of Phase I of the overall site plan. This phase will include the building of a central dining room and kitchen, computer lab, classrooms and staff office space. The second set of structures in Phase I will be strictly devoted to residential use and have 100 one and two bedroom apartments, with full baths and a small central living space. The average family size is three, so we expect to be serving an additional three hundred people. This shelter will be specifically designed for families with children, who have different needs than the single homeless population.

More specifically, the target population which would obtain benefit from this project would be those families that are homeless and of all races, ages, religions, sexes, and economical backgrounds. It is The Samaritan Inn's plan to not only meet the current need of those seeking shelter but to plan and implement those services needed as Collin County continues to expand and grow.

Specific to this project request, is funding for the infrastructure construction. These costs include the design and engineering services, sewer, surveying, and creek stabilization for a total of \$1,026,250.00. The Samaritan in requesting \$200,000.00 (19%) to be used specifically for infrastructure costs. Once accomplished, construction will begin on the residents "family" building, parking, landscaping, and staff offices. The total estimated cost of "Phase I" is about 7 million dollars.

Describe how the proposed Project/Promotion/Community Event fulfills strategic goals and objectives for the organization.

A grant from MCDC would secure our success and ensure that appropriate services are available for our citizens. We believe The Samaritan Inn offers the ultimate "return on investment" – as our program returns homeless people to the community so that they are once again contributing and self-sufficient members of society. A partnership with the MCDC would enhance our fundraising efforts and be a tangible symbol of our mutual commitment to those in need.

Since this is "Building Project," a Capital Campaign officially began at the Inn's Gala this last February. During this event the Inn was able to raise just over 1 million dollars that will go directly to support this project. Presently, there are many marketing/awareness/fundraising projects underway as part of the campaign.

The next major planned activity will be the actual ground breaking ceremony. It is anticipated that many leaders within the community will be invited to attend this historical moment.

What is the venue/location for Project/Promotion/Community Event?

The location of the 15 acre Site Plan is currently listed as two addresses within the McKinney City Limits. They are 1512 and 1514 Nth McDonald Street, McKinney, TX. 75071.

Provide a timeline for the Project/Promotion/Community Event.

The Samaritan Inn and its Board of Directors are committed to raising the balance needed while maintaining our debt free history and opening the doors of this program in 2015. Towards this end:

- on September 10th the Board of Directors had three presentations by contractors who are bidding for this project.
- a contractor (Poque) was selected in November.
- in December 2013, Collin County Housing Finance Corp. Housing Finance Assistance Program granted The Samaritan Inn \$400,000 to be specifically used for infrastructure construction.
- a building design, city permit(s), and a review acquisition was completed in January, 2014.
- a Final Plat was presented to the Planning and Zoning (City of McKinney) on a "consent agenda" and approved on 4/22.
- a project manger/advocate will be selected by the end of June*
- groundbreaking for infrastructure will take place by the end of July, 2014.
- * General oversight of this project will be under the guidance of the Executive Director and the Board of Directors of The Samaritan Inn. Specific oversight of the actual project will be conducted by a "project manager/advocate" that will be appointed by The Executive Director and the Board of Directors. The duties of this person will include the following but are not limited to:
- 1. Managing the activities of all construction of this project for The Samaritan Inn. 2. Acts as liaison between The Samaritan Inn, architects, planners, contractors, regulatory agencies, and consultants. 3. Management of the selected contractor to ensure a safe, efficient, and well-constructed facility. 4. Inspection of construction/renovation projects to assure that completed work complies with all regulatory/inspectional agency requirements. 5. Review all material bids by the contractor to assure they are within budgetary standards.
- 2. It is expected that The Samaritan Inn's construction/project "advocate" will have a working knowledge of OSHA regulations, building codes, 10 years experience in facilities management, and/or construction management. 2. Must have managed projects in the \$1 to \$5 million range. 3. Working knowledge of basic computer operations and program applications. 4. On call as appropriate. 5. Familiar with regulatory codes. 6. Knowledge of annual expense and capital budgets.

By having this advocate in place and working for the best interest of The Samaritan Inn, it will help assure that the Board of Directors are being good "stewards of the dollar" being invested into this project.

After completion of the project, the operations and maintenance will be under the direction of the Executive Director and the Management Team of The Samaritan Inn. Policies and procedures will be followed, as they are now, regarding the daily operation and maintenance of this project.

Detail goals for growth/expansion in future years.

Regarding the future, it is The Samaritan Inn's belief that this will be an ongoing project that will have many different phases to it in order to be adaptable to meet the ever changing need of the homeless in Collin County.

As can be seen by the Site Plan (Attachment IV), there are future plans for expansion which will be initiated by the construction of a "Day-Care" facility specifically for Inn residents. This will allow parents to seek employment on a daily basis, rather than the two half days that they currently are allowed. This current time restriction is due to the fact that there is limited funding available for contracted Day Care. Future plans also include the construction of separate accommodations for men and women.

The final part of the overall plan is to build a Thrift Store and a "Professional" building that would allow many of the community services (food stamps, HUD assistance, etc.) to be on site to provide more "convenient" access to their services.

Possible goals might include the selling of the current facility in order to help fund the final phases. Also, the current Admin building may be demolished to make way for another set of Gateway apartments. None of these listed plans have been finalized at this time.

No "feasibility study" or "market analysis" has been done.

The Samaritan Inn has a comprehensive client database constructed specifically to track potential clients, client demographics, services provided, and follow-up needs. The data collected through this system is also used for outcome measures and for internal and external assessment of program effectiveness. This data along with the findings provided by the Collin County Homeless Count, The United Ways Needs Assessment and Collin Counties Criminal Justice Plan reported the following:

Collin County is one of the fasted growing counties in Texas as evidenced by population growth from 492,276 in the year 2000 to 791,470 in 2010. During the period from 2000 to 2010 there were several important facts that are noteworthy:

- 1) While Collin County's population increased by 44%, the number of people who live in poverty increased by 100%.
- 2) The county experienced a 44% increase in the female head of households having children under 18.
- 3) From 2004 to 2006 there was a 65% increase in the number of seniors 65+ living in poverty
- 4) From 2004 to 2006 there was a 36% increase in the number of children under 18 years of age living in poverty.
- 5) From 2004 to 2006 there was a 67% increase in the number of African Americans living in poverty

- 6) The average number of homeless people denied shelter services in Collin County for the year 2000 was 2 per month as compared to 2009 which showed 60 people per month.
- 7) Family homelessness accounted for a 50% increase in the latest homeless count in the county.
- 8) Homeless in Collin County in 2013 had increased by 44% as compared to 2012.

Source: CCCIP-2008, pgs 4-6. While note published in the CCCIP it appears that this same trends have continued from 2008-2012. (United Way-unpublished needs assessment)

Currently The Samaritan Inn is able to assist over 500 homeless individuals in the community by providing an environment that allows them to work their way back to becoming contributing citizens within their local communities. Through this project, it is the hope that no one will be forced to live in less than adequate environment(s) that homelessness causes. Instead, they will have a viable option in attending a safe, caring, productive program/environment that will strengthen their self-esteem and allow them to pursue their individual/ family goals.

By providing an environment in which homeless individuals and families are able to find employment, and then financial independence, an expected outcome would be a decrease in the local poverty level, thus strengthening the local economy. The construction phase would provide work for many local people, business and volunteers. Once completed, the expansion would present opportunities for local citizens to become employed by The Samaritan Inn.

Through many partnerships that The Samaritan Inn has already established with businesses, City/County governments, faith based community, and private individuals, MCDC would be promoted as one of our core partners. This "awareness" would strengthen and help in the development of new relationships for the Inn and MCDC.

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IV. Marketing and Outreach

The Samarian Inn has designated a sub-committee from its Board of Directors whose goal is to coordinate fund raising activities with the Inn's marketing specialists. This committee is currently reviewing all the internal data of donors over the last 5 years. It is also reviewing the option of hiring an external "marketing" group who specializes in Capital Campaigns. This group has planned several different community activities that will cover the next 6 months. Social media is playing a large role in community awareness regarding the current needs of the project and the all upcoming events.

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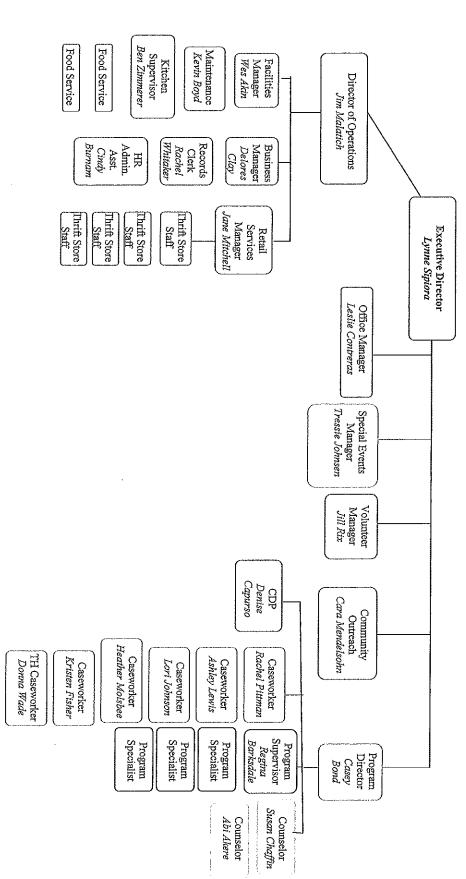

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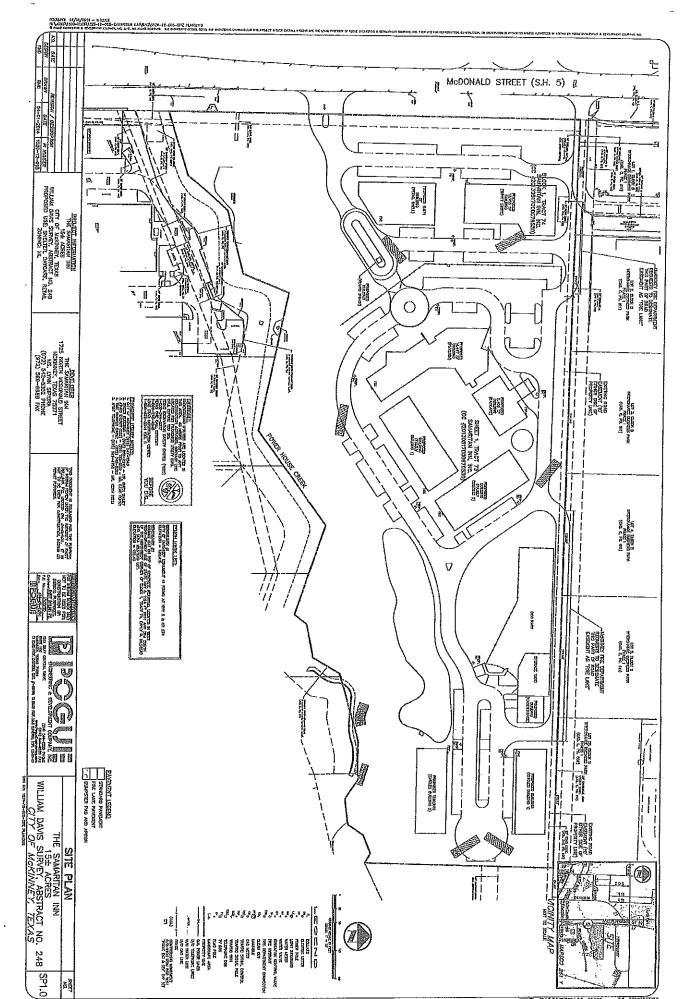


2014 ALL-STAFF ORGANIZATION CHART

A material weakness is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses.

A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance. We did not identify any significant deficiencies in internal control.

Note 1 - Nature of Activities and Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Activities

1

Samaritan Inn, Inc. (Organization) is located in McKinney, Texas and is a Texas nonprofit corporation that is classified by the Internal Revenue Service as tax-exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Organization was chartered on July 23, 1984 to provide transitional refuge for individuals and families experiencing homelessness. These people, who are in a crisis, are primarily from Collin County, desire self-sufficiency and require temporary emergency shelter.

Friends of the Inn, Inc. operates as a thrift store. Thrift store profits are transferred to Samaritan Inn to support the organization's mission of providing emergency shelter.

Samaritan Inn Foundation, also known as the Endowment Fund, was established as a separate legal entity on July 24, 2004. The Endowment Fund was established to provide resources for Samaritan Inn.

North Texas Gateway Apartments was officially opened on May 1, 2008 to graduates of Samaritan Inn. The apartments were established to allow formerly homeless people a reducedrent housing while they transitioned into mainstream housing. Tenants in North Texas Gateway Apartments are responsible for rent payments that equal 30% of the tenants' income; tenants may stay in the apartment for a maximum of 18 months from the move-in date.

The Board of Directors for Samaritan Inn, Friends of the Inn, North Texas Gateway Apartments and Samaritan Inn Foundation are under common control. Organizations with identical board members are required to consolidate financial statements, but may elect to report on a single entity as a component unit. Samaritan Inn and Samaritan Inn Foundation are presented as combined operations; Friends of the Inn and North Texas Gateway Apartments are presented as component units.

Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The summary of significant accounting policies of the Organization is presented to assist in understanding the financial statements. The financial statements and notes are representations of the Organization's management, which is responsible for their integrity and objectivity. These accounting policies conform to accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America and have been consistently applied in the preparation of the financial statements. The

financial statements of the organization have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting as a voluntary not for profit organization.

Financial Statement Presentation

The Organization's financial statements are presented in accordance with FASB ASC 958 which requires the Organization to report its financial position and activities using three classes of net assets: unrestricted, temporarily restricted and permanently restricted. Accordingly, net assets and changes therein are classified as follows:

Unrestricted Funds - Net assets not subject to donor-imposed stipulations.

Temporarily Restricted Funds – Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that may or will be met by actions of the Organization and/or the passage of time. Temporarily restricted net assets are donations received from individuals, foundations, churches, and private groups, which are designated by the donor for specific expenditures.

Permanently Restricted Funds - The Organization has no permanently restricted net assets.

Revenues are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets unless use of the related assets is limited by donor-imposed restrictions. Expenses are reported as decreases in unrestricted net assets. Expirations of temporarily restricted net assets (i.e., the donor-stipulated purpose has been fulfilled and/or the stipulated time period has elapsed) are reported as reclassifications between the applicable classes of net assets. Contributions are recognized as revenues in the period unconditional promises to give are received.

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the organization are reported on the accrual basis of accounting. Under the accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recognized when the obligation is incurred.

Budgetary Control

Annual budgets are adopted by the organization and approved by the Board of Directors. The adopted budgets are prepared on a basis consistent with generally accepted accounting principles.

Use of Estimates

Management uses estimates and assumptions in preparing financial statements. Those estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities, and reported revenues and expenses. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates. Significant estimates used in the preparation of these financial statements include the assumption in recording depreciation.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand and demand and time deposit accounts at financial institutions.

For purposes of the statement of cash flow, the organization considers all highly liquid investments available for current use with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Endowment Fund and Investments

Investments in marketable securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are reported at their fair values in the Statement of Financial Position. Unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets.

On July 24, 2004, the Board of Directors established limited funds with endowment funds. Withdrawals from the fund are approved by the Board of the Executive Committee, who is appointed by the Board of Directors. An investment policy has been approved and the funds are held in an account with investment advisors. Investment earnings are reinvested in the fund.

Inventory

The Samaritan Inn's inventory consists of purchased and donated perishable and non-perishable food items, toiletries, linens and other supplies required for the operation of a homeless shelter. Inventory of the Friends of the Inn Thrift Stores consist of recycled clothing and house wares obtained through charitable donations. The inventory balance at fiscal year-end September 30, 2013 is immaterial and not recorded on the consolidated statement of financial position.

Accrued Compensated Absences

The organization has adopted a policy that allows employees to accrue compensated absences caused on the length of employment. Sick leave is forfeited upon separation of employment. Accrued vacation, capped at 40 hours, is payable to the employee upon separation, provided the employee meets the criteria based on company policy. Estimated accrued liabilities resulting from this policy are reflected in the financial statements.

Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

Measurement focus refers to what is being measured; basis of accounting refers to when revenues and expenditures are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. Basis of accounting related to the timing of the measurement made, regardless of the measurement focus applied.

The Statement of Financial Position, Statement of Activities, Statement of Functional Expense and Statement of Cash Flows for the organization are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. The economic resources measurement focus means all assets and liabilities (whether current or non-current) are included on the Statement of Financial Position. Under the accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recognized when earned; expenses are recognized at the time the liability is incurred.

Capital Assets

Capital assets, which include property, vehicles, furniture, and equipment, are reported in the applicable financial statements. All capital assets are valued at historical costs or estimated historical cost if actual historical is not available. Donated assets are valued at their fair market value on the date of donation. Repairs and maintenance are recorded as expenses.

Depreciation has been calculated on each class of depreciable property using the straight-line method. Estimated useful lives are as follows:

Source of Support and Revenues

Major sources for the support of Samaritan Inn include: rents collected from the operation of North Texas Gateway Apartments, sales of recycled clothing and house wares from Friends of the Inn thrift store, and sales of Greater Goodies products. Other major support sources include contributions from the United Way, local churches, service clubs, newsletter recipients, pledged donations, private foundation support, governmental assistance, donated services, and fundraising events.

Donated Services and Materials

The Samaritan Inn records the value of donated materials, which consists primarily of food pantry items, at the cost per the donor. Samaritan Inn records the value of donated services based on volunteer hours, level of expertise and department served. Departments include administration, arts and crafts, direct service, donations, kitchen, maintenance, counseling, public relations, Samaritan Inn-dustires, and Friends of the Inn.

Friends of the Inn

Revenues from the sale of recycled clothing, furniture and house wares are received from the public at the thrift stores. Sales tax is recorded net at the time of final sale and is remitted to the State on a monthly basis. Sales tax remitted for the year ended September 30, 2013 was approximately \$36,000.

North Texas Gateway Apartments

Revenues from the collection of rent from tenants of the apartments are collected.

Functional Allocation of Expenses

The cost of providing programs and supporting services have been summarized on a functional basis in the Consolidated Statement of Functional Expenses. Costs are directly charged to the various programs and support services with certain costs being allocated to General & Management support services based on estimates made by management.

Income Taxes

The Organization is a not-for-profit corporation that is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code as per I.R.S. letter dated June 1, 2005. For the year ended September 30, 2013, the Samaritan Inn did not conduct any activities that would be subject to federal income taxes.

Note 2 - Cash

As of September 30, 2013, the Samaritan Inn maintains all bank accounts and certificates of deposit in financial institutions that are members of the FDIC. At fiscal year end, the organization's deposits in its depository banks totaled \$694,713.

Note 3 - Investments

Investments in marketable securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are reported at their fair values in the statement of financial position. Unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets. Investment income and gains restricted by a donor are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets if the restrictions are met (either by passage of time or by use) in the reporting period in which the income and gains are recognized.

The mutual fund advisory program for Samaritan Inn was initiated on July 7, 2005. The investment summary of this fund for the year ended September 30, 2013 is as follows:

Note 4 - Fair Value of Measurements

The "Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures" Topic of the FASB ASC (Topic 820) defines fair value as exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (an exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Topic 820 also establishes a three-level fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs used to measure fair value. This hierarchy requires entities to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. These three levels of inputs used to measure fair value are as follows:

Level I - Quoted prices for in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

Level 2 – Observable inputs other than quoted prices included in Level I, such as quote prices for similar assets and liabilities in active markets; Quoted prices for identical or similar assets and liabilities in markets that are not active; or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data.

Level 3 – Unobservable inputs that are supported by little or no market activity and that are significant to the fair value of the assets or liabilities. This includes certain pricing models, discounted cash flow methodologies and similar techniques that use significant unobservable inputs.

Fair Value of Measurements (continued)

The carrying value of cash and cash equivalents, receivables, gift cards, accounts payable and accrued expenses approximates fair value due to the relatively short-term nature of the financial instruments. Investments in marketable securities debt securities are reported at their fair values in the statement of financial position.

Note 5 - Pension Plan

As of July 5, 2007, employees are eligible to participate in an optional 403(b) retirement plan. The plan is not governed by ERISA. Employees may contribute up to \$16,500 per year. Contributions to the optional plan may be made via payroll deduction.

Note 1 - Nature of Activities and Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Activities

Samaritan Inn, Inc. (Organization) is located in McKinney, Texas and is a Texas nonprofit corporation that is classified by the Internal Revenue Service as tax-exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Organization was chartered on July 23, 1984 to provide transitional refuge for individuals and families experiencing homelessness. These people, who are in a crisis, are primarily from Collin County, desire self-sufficiency and require temporary emergency shelter.

Friends of the Inn, Inc. operates as a thrift store. Thrift store profits are transferred to Samaritan Inn to support the organization's mission of providing emergency shelter.

Samaritan Inn Foundation, also known as the Endowment Fund, was established as a separate legal entity on July 24, 2004. The Endowment Fund was established to provide resources for Samaritan Inn.

North Texas Gateway Apartments was officially opened on May 1, 2008 to graduates of Samaritan Inn. The apartments were established to allow formerly homeless people a reduced-rent housing while they transitioned into mainstream housing. Tenants in North Texas Gateway Apartments are responsible for rent payments that equal 30% of the tenants' income; tenants may stay in the apartment for a maximum of 18 months from the move-in date.

The Board of Directors for Samaritan Inn, Friends of the Inn, North Texas Gateway Apartments and Samaritan Inn Foundation are under common control. Organizations with identical board members are required to consolidate financial statements, but may elect to report on a single entity as a component unit. Samaritan Inn and Samaritan Inn Foundation are presented as combined operations; Friends of the Inn and North Texas Gateway Apartments are presented as component units.

Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The summary of significant accounting policies of the Organization is presented to assist in understanding the financial statements. The financial statements and notes are representations of the Organization's management, which is responsible for their integrity and objectivity. These accounting policies conform to accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America and have been consistently applied in the preparation of the financial statements. The

Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

financial statements of the organization have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting as a voluntary not for profit organization.

Financial Statement Presentation

The Organization's financial statements are presented in accordance with FASB ASC 958 (formerly SFAS No. 117) which requires the Organization to report its financial position and activities using three classes of net assets: unrestricted, temporarily restricted and permanently restricted. Accordingly, net assets and changes therein are classified as follows:

Unrestricted Funds - Net assets not subject to donor-imposed stipulations.

Temporarily Restricted Funds – Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that may or will be met by actions of the Organization and/or the passage of time. Temporarily restricted net assets are donations received from individuals, foundations, churches, and private groups, which are designated by the donor for specific expenditures.

Permanently Restricted Funds - The Organization has no permanently restricted net assets.

Revenues are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets unless use of the related assets is limited by donor-imposed restrictions. Expenses are reported as decreases in unrestricted net assets. Expirations of temporarily restricted net assets (i.e., the donor-stipulated purpose has been fulfilled and/or the stipulated time period has elapsed) are reported as reclassifications between the applicable classes of net assets. Contributions are recognized as revenues in the period unconditional promises to give are received.

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements of the organization are reported on the accrual basis of accounting. Under the accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recognized when the obligation is incurred.

Budgetary Control

Annual budgets are adopted by the organization and approved by the Board of Directors. The adopted budgets are prepared on a basis consistent with generally accepted accounting principles.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

Use of Estimates

Management uses estimates and assumptions in preparing financial statements. Those estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities, and reported revenues and expenses. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates. Significant estimates used in the preparation of these financial statements include the assumption in recording depreciation.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand and demand and time deposit accounts at financial institutions.

For purposes of the statement of cash flow, the organization considers all highly liquid investments available for current use with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Endowment Fund and Investments

Investments in marketable securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are reported at their fair values in the Statement of Financial Position. Unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets.

On July 24, 2004, the Board of Directors established limited funds with endowment funds. Withdrawals from the fund are approved by the Board of the Executive Committee, who is appointed by the Board of Directors. An investment policy has been approved and the funds are held in an account with investment advisors. Investment earnings are reinvested in the fund.

Inventory

The Samaritan Inn's inventory consists of purchased and donated perishable and non-perishable food items, toiletries, linens and other supplies required for the operation of a homeless shelter. Inventory of the Friends of the Inn Thrift Stores consist of recycled clothing and house wares obtained through charitable donations. The inventory balance at fiscal year-end September 30, 2012 is immaterial and not recorded on the consolidated statement of financial position.

Accrued Compensated Absences

The organization has adopted a policy that allows employees to accrue compensated absences caused on the length of employment. Sick leave is forfeited upon separation of employment. Accrued vacation, capped at 40 hours, is payable to the employee upon separation, provided the employee meets the criteria based on company policy. Estimated accrued liabilities resulting from this policy are reflected in the financial statements.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

Measurement focus refers to what is being measured; basis of accounting refers to when revenues and expenditures are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. Basis of accounting related to the timing of the measurement made, regardless of the measurement focus applied.

The Statement of Financial Position, Statement of Activities, Statement of Functional Expense and Statement of Cash Flows for the organization are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. The economic resources measurement focus means all assets and liabilities (whether current or non-current) are included on the Statement of Financial Position. Under the accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recognized when earned; expenses are recognized at the time the liability is incurred.

Capital Assets

ja L Capital assets, which include property, vehicles, furniture, and equipment, are reported in the applicable financial statements. All capital assets are valued at historical costs or estimated historical cost if actual historical is not available. Donated assets are valued at their fair market value on the date of donation. Repairs and maintenance are recorded as expenses.

Depreciation has been calculated on each class of depreciable property using the straight-line method. Estimated useful lives are as follows:

Source of Support and Revenues

Major sources for the support of Samaritan Inn include: rents collected from the operation of North Texas Gateway Apartments, sales of recycled clothing and house wares from Friends of the Inn thrift store, and sales of Greater Goodies products. Other major support sources include contributions from the United Way, local churches, service clubs, newsletter recipients, pledged donations, private foundation support, governmental assistance, donated services, and fundraising events.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

Donated Services and Materials

The Samaritan Inn records the value of donated materials, which consists primarily of food pantry items, at the cost per the donor. Samaritan Inn records the value of donated services based on volunteer hours, level of expertise and department served. Departments include administration, arts and crafts, direct service, donations, kitchen, maintenance, counseling, public relations, Samaritan Inn-dustires, and Friends of the Inn.

Friends of the Inn

Revenues from the sale of recycled clothing, furniture and house wares are received from the public at the thrift stores. Sales tax is recorded net at the time of final sale and is remitted to the State on a monthly basis. Sales tax remitted for the year ended September 30, 2012 was \$35,093.

North Texas Gateway Apartments

Revenues from the collection of rent from tenants of the apartments are collected.

Functional Allocation of Expenses

The cost of providing programs and supporting services have been summarized on a functional basis in the Consolidated Statement of Functional Expenses. Costs are directly charged to the various programs and support services with certain costs being allocated to General & Management support services based on estimates made by management.

Income Taxes

The Organization is a not-for-profit corporation that is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code as per I.R.S. letter dated June 1, 2005. For the year ended September 30, 2012, the Samaritan Inn did not conduct any activities that would be subject to federal income taxes.

Note 2 - Cash

As of September 30, 2012, the Samaritan Inn maintains all bank accounts and certificates of deposit in financial institutions that are members of the FDIC. At fiscal year end, the organization's deposits in its depository banks totaled \$286,841.

Note 3 - Investments

Investments in marketable securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are reported at their fair values in the statement of financial position. Unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets. Investment income and gains restricted by a donor are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets if the restrictions are met (either by passage of time or by use) in the reporting period in which the income and gains are recognized.

The mutual fund advisory program for Samaritan Inn was initiated on July 7, 2005. The investment summary of this fund for the year ended September 30, 2012 is as follows:

Note 4 - Fair Value of Measurements

The "Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures" Topic of the FASB ASC (Topic 820) defines fair value as exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (an exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Topic 820 also establishes a three-level fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs used to measure fair value. This hierarchy requires entities to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. These three levels of inputs used to measure fair value are as follows:

Level 1 - Quoted prices for in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

Level 2 – Observable inputs other than quoted prices included in Level I, such as quote prices for similar assets and liabilities in active markets; Quoted prices for identical or similar assets and liabilities in markets that are not active; or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data.

Level 3 – Unobservable inputs that are supported by little or no market activity and that are significant to the fair value of the assets or liabilities. This includes certain pricing models, discounted cash flow methodologies and similar techniques that use significant unobservable inputs.

Note 1 - Nature of Activities and Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Activities

Samaritan Inn, Inc. (Organization) is located in McKinney, Texas and is a Texas nonprofit corporation that is classified by the Internal Revenue Service as tax-exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Organization was chartered on July 23, 1984 to provide transitional refuge for individuals and families experiencing homelessness. These people, who are in a crisis, are primarily from Collin County, desire self-sufficiency and require temporary emergency shelter.

Friends of the Inn, Inc. operates as a thrift store. Thrift store profits are transferred to Samaritan Inn to support the organization's mission of providing emergency shelter.

Samaritan Inn Foundation, also known as the Endowment Fund, was established as a separate legal entity on July 24, 2004. The Endowment Fund was established to provide resources for Samaritan Inn.

North Texas Gateway Apartments was officially opened on May 1, 2008 to graduates of Samaritan Inn. The apartments were established to allow formerly homeless people a reduced-rent housing while they transitioned into mainstream housing. Tenants in North Texas Gateway Apartments are responsible for rent payments that equal 30% of the tenants' income; tenants may stay in the apartment for a maximum of 18 months from the move-in date.

The Board of Directors for Samaritan Inn, Friends of the Inn, North Texas Gateway Apartments and Samaritan Inn Foundation are under common control. Organizations with identical board members are required to consolidate financial statements, but may elect to report on a single entity as a component unit. Samaritan Inn and Samaritan Inn Foundation are presented as combined operations; Friends of the Inn and North Texas Gateway Apartments are presented as component units.

Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The summary of significant accounting policies of the Organization is presented to assist in understanding the financial statements. The financial statements and notes are representations of the Organization's management, which is responsible for their integrity and objectivity. These accounting policies conform to accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America and have been consistently applied in the preparation of the financial statements. The

financial statements of the organization have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting as a voluntary not for profit organization.

Financial Statement Presentation

The Organization's financial statements are presented in accordance with FASB ASC 958 (formerly SFAS No. 117) which requires the Organization to report its financial position and activities using three classes of net assets: unrestricted, temporarily restricted and permanently restricted. Accordingly, net assets and changes therein are classified as follows:

Unrestricted Funds - Net assets not subject to donor-imposed stipulations.

Temporarily Restricted Funds – Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that may or will be met by actions of the Organization and/or the passage of time. Temporarily restricted net assets are donations received from individuals, foundations, churches, and private groups, which are designated by the donor for specific expenditures.

Permanently Restricted Funds - The Organization has no permanently restricted net assets.

Revenues are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets unless use of the related assets is limited by donor-imposed restrictions. Expenses are reported as decreases in unrestricted net assets. Expirations of temporarily restricted net assets (i.e., the donor-stipulated purpose has been fulfilled and/or the stipulated time period has elapsed) are reported as reclassifications between the applicable classes of net assets. Contributions are recognized as revenues in the period unconditional promises to give are received.

Basis of Accounting

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The financial statements of the organization are reported on the accrual basis of accounting. Under the accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recognized when the obligation is incurred.

Budgetary Control

Annual budgets are adopted by the organization and approved by the Board of Directors. The adopted budgets are prepared on a basis consistent with generally accepted accounting principles.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

Use of Estimates

Management uses estimates and assumptions in preparing financial statements. Those estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities, and reported revenues and expenses. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates. Significant estimates used in the preparation of these financial statements include the assumption in recording depreciation.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand and demand and time deposit accounts at financial institutions.

For purposes of the statement of cash flow, the organization considers all highly liquid investments available for current use with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Endowment Fund and Investments

Investments in marketable securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are reported at their fair values in the Statement of Financial Position. Unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets.

On July 24, 2004, the Board of Directors established limited funds with endowment funds. Withdrawals from the fund are approved by the Board of the Executive Committee, who is appointed by the Board of Directors. An investment policy has been approved and the funds are held in an account with investment advisors. Investment earnings are reinvested in the fund.

Inventory

The Samaritan Inn's inventory consists of purchased and donated perishable and non-perishable food items, toiletries, linens and other supplies required for the operation of a homeless shelter. Inventory of the Friends of the Inn Thrift Stores consist of recycled clothing and house wares obtained through charitable donations. The inventory balance at fiscal year-end September 30, 2012 is immaterial and not recorded on the consolidated statement of financial position.

Accrued Compensated Absences

The organization has adopted a policy that allows employees to accrue compensated absences caused on the length of employment. Sick leave is forfeited upon separation of employment. Accrued vacation, capped at 40 hours, is payable to the employee upon separation, provided the employee meets the criteria based on company policy. Estimated accrued liabilities resulting from this policy are reflected in the financial statements.

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Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

Measurement focus refers to what is being measured; basis of accounting refers to when revenues and expenditures are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. Basis of accounting related to the timing of the measurement made, regardless of the measurement focus applied.

The Statement of Financial Position, Statement of Activities, Statement of Functional Expense and Statement of Cash Flows for the organization are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. The economic resources measurement focus means all assets and liabilities (whether current or non-current) are included on the Statement of Financial Position. Under the accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recognized when earned; expenses are recognized at the time the liability is incurred.

Capital Assets

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Capital assets, which include property, vehicles, furniture, and equipment, are reported in the applicable financial statements. All capital assets are valued at historical costs or estimated historical cost if actual historical is not available. Donated assets are valued at their fair market value on the date of donation. Repairs and maintenance are recorded as expenses.

Depreciation has been calculated on each class of depreciable property using the straight-line method. Estimated useful lives are as follows:

Source of Support and Revenues

Major sources for the support of Samaritan Inn include: rents collected from the operation of North Texas Gateway Apartments, sales of recycled clothing and house wares from Friends of the Inn thrift store, and sales of Greater Goodies products. Other major support sources include contributions from the United Way, local churches, service clubs, newsletter recipients, pledged donations, private foundation support, governmental assistance, donated services, and fundraising events.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements (continued)

Donated Services and Materials

The Samaritan Inn records the value of donated materials, which consists primarily of food pantry items, at the cost per the donor. Samaritan Inn records the value of donated services based on volunteer hours, level of expertise and department served. Departments include administration, arts and crafts, direct service, donations, kitchen, maintenance, counseling, public relations, Samaritan Inn-dustires, and Friends of the Inn.

Friends of the Inn

Revenues from the sale of recycled clothing, furniture and house wares are received from the public at the thrift stores. Sales tax is recorded net at the time of final sale and is remitted to the State on a monthly basis. Sales tax remitted for the year ended September 30, 2012 was \$35,093.

North Texas Gateway Apartments

Revenues from the collection of rent from tenants of the apartments are collected.

Functional Allocation of Expenses

The cost of providing programs and supporting services have been summarized on a functional basis in the Consolidated Statement of Functional Expenses. Costs are directly charged to the various programs and support services with certain costs being allocated to General & Management support services based on estimates made by management.

Income Taxes

The Organization is a not-for-profit corporation that is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code as per I.R.S. letter dated June 1, 2005. For the year ended September 30, 2012, the Samaritan Inn did not conduct any activities that would be subject to federal income taxes.

Note 2 - Cash

As of September 30, 2012, the Samaritan Inn maintains all bank accounts and certificates of deposit in financial institutions that are members of the FDIC. At fiscal year end, the organization's deposits in its depository banks totaled \$286,841.

Note 3 – Investments

Investments in marketable securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are reported at their fair values in the statement of financial position. Unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets. Investment income and gains restricted by a donor are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets if the restrictions are met (either by passage of time or by use) in the reporting period in which the income and gains are recognized.

The mutual fund advisory program for Samaritan Inn was initiated on July 7, 2005. The investment summary of this fund for the year ended September 30, 2012 is as follows:

Note 4 - Fair Value of Measurements

The "Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures" Topic of the FASB ASC (Topic 820) defines fair value as exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (an exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. Topic 820 also establishes a three-level fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs used to measure fair value. This hierarchy requires entities to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. These three levels of inputs used to measure fair value are as follows:

Level 1 - Quoted prices for in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

Level 2 – Observable inputs other than quoted prices included in Level I, such as quote prices for similar assets and liabilities in active markets; Quoted prices for identical or similar assets and liabilities in markets that are not active; or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data.

Level 3 – Unobservable inputs that are supported by little or no market activity and that are significant to the fair value of the assets or liabilities. This includes certain pricing models, discounted cash flow methodologies and similar techniques that use significant unobservable inputs.
