



## Site Plan







#### Work of A.W. Dowlen

621 N. Church St.

When Arthur Dowlen came to McKinney in 1893, he spent the next seven years working as a teacher. He left that profession to become a contractor and quickly became one of McKinney's most popular builders. It is not known who designed the homes that he build but they all have a distinctive flourish that seems intended to catch a person's attention. Exaggerate eave returns and jerkinhead roofs are good examples of some of attention-getting elements he constructed.









Arthur Dowlen built homes during a time when interest in the Victorian Style was nearly all but gone, replaced by the more popular Craftsman Style and the stately Prairie Style. Mr. Dowlen seemed to have no difficulty understanding how to respond to the different construction techniques each of these styles required. His success as a builder in McKinney allowed him to tap into the building market in Dallas which lead him to move there in 1920. NOTE: The house at 1215 Tucker St. is often called the Richard Bass house in many historical writings, however, it was originally built for LeRoy Fizgerald in 1915.
