The Gilda Garcia Garza Story

Gilda Garcia Garza was a born leader. From early childhood, Gilda was a strong-willed go-getter. Her family describes her as inquisitive, exploratory and motivated. These characteristics stayed with her for her entire life.

Gilda's Early Years in McKinney

Born on April 18, 1950, into a loving family consisting of her parents and seven siblings, Gilda was a third-generation Garcia in McKinney, Texas. Her father and mother, Raymond Earl Garcia and Maria Carmel Urbano Garcia, believed in independent thinking, team spirit, and hard work. Raymond Garcia was a successful entrepreneur who built a thriving sheep-shearing business covering multiple counties in North Texas. During the agricultural era, Raymond Garcia's company serviced farms and ranches for three decades. And this is where I met the Garcia family. I grew up on farmland, part of which is now the property where McKinney North High School and Scott Johnson Middle School now stand. During sheep-shearing season in the springtime, I always looked forward to rushing home after school to watch the Garcia team masterfully shearing the sheep. I was amazed at the patience and artistry that had to be demonstrated in that process. Gilda's dad was always patient with me as I watched in wonder as the wool would be sheared off in one blanket with absolutely no harm to the sheep. He was always kind and welcomed all my questions. Those years contribute to some of my fondest childhood memories.

In the East McKinney area was La Loma, which translated from Spanish to English, means "The Hill." That predominately Hispanic area is where Gilda grew up and was where she was an early trailblazer. She was a charter student in the Holy Family School. Then she entered first grade at J. W. Webb Elementary School. During her youth, she enjoyed socializing and participating in various activities with children in La Loma neighborhood. She excelled in sports, and especially loved playing softball at Mouzon Field and volleyball behind the neighborhood church. Gilda attended L. A. Scott Junior High School and McKinney High School where she graduated in the Class of 1968. As a student, she was always involved, friendly, and likeable.

Higher Education, Career, and Family

After high school graduation in 1968, Gilda attended the National Training Institute of Technology and Business College in South Dallas studying Computer Automation. She also attended Collin College and majored in Business Management.

For twenty years, Gilda worked in administration for the North Texas Job Corps, a Department of Labor training program, and retired from that position in 2016.

During this time, Gilda was also parenting her only child. And later, Gilda became the proud grandmother of three grandchildren.

Community Service

As a lifetime member of St. Michael the Archangel Catholic Church in McKinney, Gilda's worldview was fashioned by her belief in human dignity and equality. She believed in a life of service to others. And consistently strove to leave the world a better place because of her influence and diligence.

The crowning distinction of Gilda's efforts for the betterment of her hometown of McKinney was her election to the McKinney City Council representing District 1. Throughout her life, Gilda was aware of the need for improvements in the infrastructure of East McKinney and constantly worked to make things better for residents in La Loma and, in fact, for all the residents who lived in her district. In 2001, Gilda campaigned and won the election to the McKinney City Council for

for a two-year term and became the first Hispanic woman to serve on the McKinney City Council. After that election, she was re-elected to two three-year terms: one, in 2003 and another, in 2006.

During her tenure on the McKinney City Council, Gilda spent her time making sure that parts of the District 1 infrastructure were updated and that children had a safe place for recreational activities. She was keenly aware that in the summer months, children and youth were needing to ride bicycles, walk, or find a ride to the Juanita Maxfield Aquatic Center north of town on Highway 5. In her opinion, and in reality, that was a distance too far for young people to go to swim. As a result, Gilda began to campaign for a new aquatic center to be built in Old Settler's Park for the safety and convenience of the children and youth. Her efforts paid off greatly. The Old Settler's Park Aquatic Center was constructed and opened for public use for the enjoyment of people of all ages.

While serving on the McKinney City Council, Gilda was the council's liaison for the Planning & Zoning Commission, Municipal Library Board, Convention and Visitors Bureau, and the Transportation Committee.

However, Gilda's public service and recognition for that service does not begin nor end with her city council work. Gilda also participated in numerous other endeavors as follows:

Citizenship McKinney, a leadership program of the McKinney Chamber of Commerce;

Charter member of Citizen's Police Academy and its Alumni Association;

McKinney charter member of the League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC) and was the first female president of the revitalized Council #608 of LULAC;

Charter member of Citizens on Patrol (COP), McKinney;

2000 Habitat for Humanity member;

North Texas Job Corps Community Relations Council member;

Recognized in August, 2005, by the Budweiser Corporation as one of the top five Hispanic leaders in Collin County.

A Life Well Lived

May 16, 2019 was declared Councilwoman Gilda Garcia Garza Day in McKinney, Texas, by Mayor George Fuller, and he read the proclamation at her memorial service on that day.

Gilda Garcia Garza gave her best self to God, her family, and her lifetime hometown of McKinney, Texas. As a fine example of leadership, Gilda left a lasting legacy that will never be forgotten by those who knew her. Additionally, those who have never met her will have availed themselves of all the improvements influenced by her in the city of McKinney. For these reasons and more, many of the residents of District 1 as well as the citizens of greater McKinney, will always appreciate the life and work of Gilda Garcia Garza.

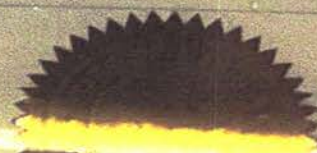

April 18, 1950 - May 8, 2019

Gilda Garcia Garza of McKinney, Texas passed away May 8, 2019 at the age of 69. She was born April 18, 1950 to Raymond Earl Garcia and Maria Del Carmel (Urbano) Garcia in McKinney, Texas. Gilda was a 1968 graduate of McKinney High School. She continued her education at National Training Institute of Technology and Business College in South Dallas studying Computer Automation and attended Collin College majoring in Business Management. Gilda worked in administration for twenty years for North Texas Job Corps, a Department of Labor training program before her retirement in 2016. As a native of McKinney, Gilda contributed and served her city in many capacities. She was a member and served as a local and national officer for the McKinney LULAC Chapter #608 for many years. In 2000, Gilda was elected to the McKinney City Council, as the first Hispanic female to be elected to city government, and was re-elected twice, the maximum terms allowed. She ran simply because her District needed representation. She served District 1, which she felt had been neglected, specifically its infrastructure. She'll never forget when a council member drove her around her district, one street after another, and together, they prioritized which street needed the most work. She also recalled standing up for her district when council proposed a new community pool. Thanks to her, the children on the east side of McKinney got their pool. Gilda was a lifetime member of St. Michael the Archangel Catholic Church in McKinney.

She is survived by her daughter, Andrea Nichols and husband, David of McKinney, Texas; grandchildren, Cristian Biddenstadt, Ysabel "Yzzy" Nichols and Piper Nichols all of McKinney, Texas; sister, Onesma Dominguez of McKinney, Texas; sisters-in-law, Martha Garcia of Plano, Texas, Patsy Garcia of McKinney, Texas and Helen Sepulbeda of McKinney, Texas; numerous nieces, nephews, and other loving family members and friends.

Gilda was preceded in death by her parents, Earl and Carmel Garcia; siblings, Ysabel "Ace" Sepulbeda, Felix "Bull" Garcia, Raymond "Wildman" Garcia and wife, Doris, Alfonso "Ben" Garcia, Jesse "Terry" Garcia, Maria "Anita" Garcia; brother-in-law, Rudy Dominguez; and nephews, Raymond Garcia and Tony Garcia.

A funeral mass will be held 11:00 a.m., Thursday, May 16, 2019 at St. Michaels the Archangel Catholic Church, 411 Paula Road, McKinney, Texas with Father Juan Carlos Marin Cortes officiating. Interment is to follow at Pecan Grove

RE: Renaming of Old Settler's Park to Honor Councilwoman Gilda Garza

It is with great pleasure and honor that I write this letter in full support of modifying/renaming "Old Settler's Park" to honor former Councilwoman Gilda Garza. Having first met Gilda in the mid 1990's, I was struck by her love of community, deep roots in McKinney and never-ending passion to make a difference in people's lives.

Prior to launching our group of companies collectively known as The Sanchez Group, the City of McKinney recruited me to launch the "Long Range Planning Division" for the City. One of the many initiatives this office was responsible for was to engage the local community for an accurate Census 2000. McKinney was at a pivotal crossroads and the 2000 Census was critical. Gilda worked for the North Texas Job Corps, at the time, and she was instrumental with the community awareness program we created for the 2000 Census. Gilda worked tirelessly to engage the community about the importance of the Census and the financial impacts.

Upon her election to City Council, Gilda continued her advocacy for the broader city and her district. Under Gilda's guidance, the City continued to invest in life/safety infrastructure in District 1, authorized the aquatic facility at Old Settler's Park, made renovations to Juanita Maxfield, constructed Airport Road, made improvements to Industrial Boulevard, strengthened the City's Mainstreet Program, and expanded the City's CDBG / HOME / P.R.I.D.E. programs. Gilda was an avid supporter of workforce housing initiatives, Habitat for Humanity, Holy Family School and the Samaritan Inn. Due to Gilda's strategic support, the McKinney Housing Authority set on a path to update and redevelop Newsome Homes and Merritt Homes. Although we didn't always agree on every policy position, Gilda's dedication and passion for District 1 was never in doubt. Gilda was a steadfast visionary and her smile ultimately charmed even the most ardent opponents.

On several occasions, she took the time to drive me through District 1; sometimes we even walked the streets. We would knock on doors, make wellness visits with her neighbors, talk

about neighborhood issues with the residents – truly getting to know the community. Upon her passing, the impact that she made to McKinney was evident. There was “Standing Room Only” at St. Michael’s Catholic Church to celebrate her life and mourn her passing. In attendance were not only friends and family, but colleagues from all walks of life. There were past councilmembers, Mayor’s, city managers, church/civic leaders and community advocates. Even though Gilda passed away several years ago, she is still loved and remembered. At the inaugural “Dia de los Muertos” (*Day of the Dead*) celebration in 2021, Gilda was honored and remembered.

I was honored to have worked with her and for her. Since the days that I left the public sector, I have been proud to call her my friend.
