

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McKinney Community Development Corporation Awards \$436,478 in Project Grants

McKinney, Texas (October 15, 2014) – The McKinney Community Development Corporation (MCDC) has announced grant awards totaling \$436,478 for project grants that improve the quality of life in McKinney.

The mission of the McKinney Community Development Corporation is to work proactively, in partnership with others to promote and fund community, cultural and economic development projects that maintain and enhance the quality of life in McKinney. MCDC receives revenue from a half-cent sales tax and is guided by a City Council-appointed board of seven McKinney residents.

Each year, MCDC accepts grant applications for projects eligible for consideration for approval under the parameters of the Texas Local Government Code. Following submission of the grant applications, MCDC board members conduct a public hearing on the requests where presentations are made by each of the applicants describing the impact of their proposed programs on the McKinney community, questions are addressed and the public has an opportunity to comment on the proposed projects.

Listed below are the grants awarded by McKinney Community Development Corporation at its September board meeting:

- TAPS (Texoma Area Paratransit System, Inc.) \$218,500 for the installation of bus shelters, bus stop seating, signage and bike racks. The improvements and installation of ancillary infrastructure will provide residents in the City of McKinney with improved mobility.
- North Collin County Habitat for Humanity \$188,870 for neighborhood revitalization initiative projects, and land acquisition/ lot preparation for construction of affordable housing. The grant will support the acquisition of six lots for affordable housing, surveys and preparation of ten lots in addition to supporting the neighborhood revitalization initiative's 27 exterior home repairs and a success measures training and program.

- Heard Natural Science Museum and Wildlife Sanctuary \$17,108 for the construction
 of a retaining wall, installation of railing and installation of lighting. The retaining wall
 will separate the amphitheater from the service road and the railing will be installed on
 the retainer wall. Additionally, streetlights will be installed to improve visibility during
 evening events.
- Heritage Guild of Collin County \$12,000 for improvements to the Dulaney House at Chestnut Square in preparation for a conversion to a bed and breakfast facility. The grant from MCDC will fund electrical improvements.

"Sales tax dollars generated from local dining and shopping make it possible to fund project grants that improve the quality of life in McKinney. The members of the McKinney Community Development Corporation board of directors recognize the positive impact seen in the community as a result of these projects and welcome the opportunity to support organizations that enhance quality of life in McKinney," said Cindy Schneible, MCDC Executive Director.

In addition to project grant awards, each year, the MCDC board allocates funds for grants designed to promote the City of McKinney through events or other initiatives that support tourism, promote the city for the purpose of business development.

Applications for the next cycle of promotional and community event grants will be accepted through January 2, 2015.

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McKinney National Airport Celebrates groundbreaking of new hangar Oct. 13, day of Wright Amendment expiration

TKI is the Wright Place for Corporate and General Aviation Aircraft

McKINNEY, TEXAS (Oct. 9, 2014) — McKinney National Airport is celebrating the end of the Wright Amendment by breaking ground on a new 18,000-square-foot hangar. The ceremony on Monday, Oct. 13 at 3 p.m. at the airport, 1500 E. Industrial Blvd., will include brief comments by city officials and a ceremonial groundbreaking. In September, the McKinney Community Development Corporation (MCDC) approved a \$1.5 million project grant for the hangar.

"Increased commercial operations at Love Field Airport will potentially make it tougher for corporate pilots to meet

demanding schedules. McKinney National Airport is an excellent option for corporate jets in the metroplex," said McKinney Mayor Brian Loughmiller. "Our airport offers amenities like on-site customs, location on the fringe of Class-B airspace and award-winning ground services without the inevitable wait times that come with more planes competing for access to taxiways and runways."

The new hangar will accommodate transient aircraft of all sizes, from small, single-engine aircraft to large jet aircraft for either long-term or short-term stays. The project is expected to be complete within a year.

"This addition offers needed additional storage space for general aviation and business customers. We anticipate an increase in traffic with the end of the Wright Amendment, and we want to be prepared," said Ken Wiegand, McKinney National Airport Executive Director.

McKinney National Airport is home to corporate jets that travel worldwide. Formerly Collin County Regional Airport, the general aviation business airport was renamed following the city's purchase of the airport facilities and fixed base operator (FBO) in November 2013 and after receiving a national designation by the FAA. The national category designation is earned by the number of annual operations, sophistication of infrastructure, aero-medial service and number and type of based aircraft. Only 84 general aviation airports in the country are in this national category.

McKinney Air Center, FBO that provides fuel and other services to aircraft at McKinney National Airport, was voted best in the nation in the 2014 Pilots' Choice Awards by FltPlan.com. The airport's control tower was also voted best in the nation because of the excellent service air traffic controllers provide.

In 2012, \$70 million in upgrades were completed at McKinney National Airport. Improvements included the completion of a

new, longer and wider runway with more weight-bearing capacity, a state-of-the-art air traffic control tower and managed perimeter access control.

This year, Monarch Air, a leading provider of aviation services, announced the lease of a significant portion of a 53,750 square-foot hangar and office facility at the airport to offer a wide range of services including aircraft maintenance, flight training, charter service, fleet management, acquisitions and sales for the private sector.

In addition to Monarch Air, First Flight selected McKinney National Airport as its new headquarters. First Flight is a fully licensed air ambulance company that provides around-the-clock medical air transport for emergency and nonemergency patients from rural area hospitals.

North Collin County Habitat gets \$188K grant for neighborhood revitalization in McKinney

McKinney officials on Tuesday approved an \$188,870 grant for North Collin County Habitat for Humanity for neighborhood revitalization and affordable housing.

The McKinney Community Development Corporation will provide the money from a pool of funds budgeted for project grants this past fiscal year. The grant will not negatively impact MCDC's ability to fund projects in coming months.

The City Council, which must approve all MCDC-funded projects of \$100,000 or more, did so with a 6-1 vote.

The funding, which NCC Habitat requested in July, will use \$87,750 to repair and rehabilitate 27 homes in low-moderate income eastern McKinney neighborhoods. Rehab work is set to begin Oct. 18.

NCC Habitat will use the rest of the funding to acquire six lots – \$60,000 for six new homes – as well as lot surveys and lot preparation, and about \$1,000 for a software program that gauges residents' satisfaction with city services.

"The McKinney Community Development Corporation applauds the mission and work of North Collin County Habitat for Humanity," said Cindy Schneible, MCDC executive director, in an emailed statement. "The contributions made by the organization to provide affordable housing and neighborhood revitalization safeguard quality of life and the vibrant business climate and economic development that is taking place in McKinney – making it the best place to live in America."

The initiative is part of a large-scale Cities of Service partnership between the city, NCC Habitat, and other nonprofits and volunteers called "Together We Serve." The construction portion began in 2012 with a Homebuilders Blitz, and the initiative addresses new construction, rehab and repairs, clean-up and homeowners' education to "achieve financial stability and build healthy, stable neighborhoods,"

according to NCC Habitat's funding application.

Target neighborhoods, all east of the downtown square, include LaLoma, Rockwall, Wilcox, Mouzon and Lewisville. To date, 25 projects have been completed in LaLoma, including 18 new homes; 23 completed in Rockwall Phase 1 and two in process for Phase 2; and inspection surveys are being done in Rockwall and Wilcox, according to the application.

"As homes are revitalized, a better quality of life and sustainable communities are created," the application stated.

NCC Habitat plans to serve 40 families through the program this fiscal year. According to the application, each project costs about \$3,250 cash and \$2,000 in donated materials. The nonprofit has gained partners for the initiative and this year received a \$5,000 grant from Viewpoint Bank for the Builders Blitz and neighborhood revitalization.

The grant approved Tuesday is necessary because of a continued drop-off in Community Development Block Grant funds from the city, according to officials. NCC Habitat previously received \$70,000 in CDBG money, but that number has dipped to \$10,000 in recent years – and the cost of land has increased, said Celeste Haiduk Cox, NCC Habitat executive director.

"If we don't get [the funding], we can't do the projects," Cox said. "We have to find other sources."

Many homes to be rehabbed are owned by senior citizens or are vacant. The revitalization projects will serve an average family size of four and would average a cost of \$680 per person, according to the application.

"So many structures need it, but the residents don't have the means to pay for it," Cox said.

Councilwoman Geralyn Kever, who voted in favor of the funding request, said NCC Habitat "is a good steward of their money." Councilman Roger Harris recognized the community's need for the program and said he'd rather see it addressed on a single-family basis than with multi-family residential.

Councilman Don Day, the lone dissenting vote, agreed that NCC Habitat provides a necessary service, saying he recently contributed money to its cause. But, he said, the newly constructed homes will require more than \$400 a year in city services and support from taxpayers "for generations to come."

"I do not believe it is the city's job to give taxpayers' money to private charity," Day told the Council.

On average, Habitat homeowners pay about \$1,200 annually in property taxes, according to Cox. MCDC funds come from the city's 4B sales tax, instead of from its general fund budget. Affordable housing is a high priority for such funds in cities around the nation, Cox said.

Earlier this year, NCC Habitat received a \$225,000 grant from the county for neighborhood revitalization projects in other cities. It relies on MCDC funding for McKinney projects.

Most of the McKinney homes are east of McDonald Street where many residents earn less than 60 percent of the area median income. NCC Habitat will acquire six lots at an average of \$10,000 each. Small lots in the area are selling on the open market for \$10,000-\$12,000, according to officials.

NCC Habitat has already approved six families for new homes in McKinney. Construction is underway on one home and work will begin on another home in January.

Since its inception in 1992, NCC Habitat has built 90 homes and rehabilitated 69 others "in a continuing effort to revitalize the community," the application stated.
