I. Applying Organization

Describe the mission, strategic goals and objectives, scope of services, day to day operations and number of paid staff and volunteers.

Disclose and summarize any significant, planned organizational changes and describe their potential impact on the Project/Promotional/Community Event for which funds are requested.

The mission of the McKinney Rotary Foundation has not changed since the original grant proposal submitted May 2016. It is to provide humanitarian services and support to improve the quality of life for better health, well-being and education of all populations, including the underserved through many avenues; including improved recreation options, health care options and opportunities and leadership training and scholarships. Historically, the Rotary Foundation has fulfilled its mission through scholarships, supporting youth leadership training through camperships to RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership Awards), sponsoring INTERACT clubs at the high school level and ROTARACT clubs at the college level, providing for basic needs such as clothing, hygiene products, choir and band fees and school supplies for students living at or below the poverty level, and supporting the Community Health Clinic among other local service opportunities. Internationally, the McKinney Rotary Foundation is the charitable arm of Rotary International, and continues to support eradicating polio, clean water initiatives, promoting peace, combating poverty and illiteracy throughout the world. The Rotary believes nurturing and supporting the physical and psychological aspects of one's life are equally relevant to improved self-esteem, social skills, over all well-being and quality of life.

Two years ago, we became aware McKinney children with special needs had no recreational site focusing on their diverse abilities for play. The same issue applied to families who have a disabled parent or a family with several children; one of whom has special needs. An All-Abilities Playground addresses more than a quality of life issue. Knowing the community recognizes the specialized needs these families require goes to the core of a child's feeling of self-worth and inclusion of the family in the community. The impact affects the health of the child, each family and ultimately, the community. Our goals and objectives are to work with the City of McKinney in a public/private partnership to construct an All-Abilities Playground in which all children, regardless of physical or cognitive ability, can access and play in a McKinney park. In the two years we have been in the community listening to parents, teachers and children, the need for this All-Abilities Playground has become more evident. The Rotary Foundation believes it will become a "destination playground" for Collin County. The Rotary's strategic goal and objective is to empower all children to play side by side, choosing equipment adapted for various needs and challenging their abilities; improving their self-esteem and social skills, enhancing their well-being and improving their quality of life both physically and psychologically.

The two McKinney Rotary Clubs are comprised of 135 businessmen and women who volunteer their time and talents to the community; exemplifying the motto "Service Above Self". Each club meets once a week. This project is under the auspices of the Rotary Foundation as an extension of the McKinney Rotary Club and is an IRS recognized 501(C)3 entity. For this project, the two Rotary Clubs have formed a partnership and combined leadership team of ten volunteer members which meets bi-monthly. A bookkeeper and a certified public accountant are the only contracted paid staff for the McKinney Rotary Foundation.

New officers for the Foundation and both of the Rotary Clubs have been elected and will take office on July 1, 2017. There will be little impact on the project as the current "leadership staff" will remain for the

length of the project. The officers are already active in the proposed project and will continue to be active for the duration.

II. Project (whichever is applicable)

Outline details of the Project for which funds are requested. Include information regarding scope, goals, objectives, target audience.

In March 2015, Rotary members met with the Assistant City Manager and the Parks & Open Spaces Director to discuss the need for an All-Abilities Playground in McKinney. New recreational facilities were being planned and scheduled for construction which would not be accessible or accommodate children with special needs or disabled adults. Accessibility and equipment for children with sensory and cognitive issues or who were developmentally delayed became the topics of conversation. Where can these children play in McKinney? Are they safe? Per the McKinney ISD, there were approximately 2,700 students (10% of the student population) enrolled in the special population program in 2016-17. This percentage did not include preschool, homeschooled, and privately schooled children. It also did not include children living in McKinney who attended adjacent school districts. While these children are not all mobility restricted, many with Autism, Down Syndrome and cognitive issues are often restricted or hesitant about playing on standard playground equipment. These children and their families were our "target audience". A secondary audience is families who have never had the opportunity to interact with children with special needs; giving them the chance to seek "commonalities" rather than "differences". An agreement was drafted by the Parks & Open Spaces Department and approved by the City Council to allow The Rotary Foundation to raise funds for an All-Abilities Playground within Bonnie Wenk Park Phase II. The City of McKinney agreed to redesign the adjacent sites and parking area to enhance safety and accessibility. The Rotary Foundation's participation included assisting in the design and raising funds required for an All-Abilities Playground, while the site remains part of the City of McKinney's Phase II development of Bonnie Wenk Park. Final approval for fund raising was made in December 2015 and The Rotary Foundation began contacting businesses, the community and seeking grants. During the year of fund raising, parents of children with special needs have shared their stories of living in McKinney while caring for a child with special needs. This is a quality of life issue for parents and children of all socio-economic levels. Being "affluent" has little impact on having a child being able to play in a natural public area where choice, safety and accessibility are unrestricted. The National Survey of Children with Special Health Care Needs results indicate "Having a child with special health care needs can affect a family's finances, employment status, and mental health. The demands on families may require that parents cut down their work hours or give up a job, at the same time that they face burdensome out-of-pocket health care costs." (http://www.kdheks.gov/shcn/download/Finances.pdf) While McKinney and the surrounding areas are somewhat affluent, it is precisely this cohort which suffers financial stressors as much as the less affluent families primarily due to the fact they do not qualify for many lower income health benefits such as Medicaid. Many of the services they require to maintain the general health of their children with special needs are not included in their insurance plans or have limitations.

The Rotary Foundation's scope, goals, objectives and target audience are interwoven into the fabric of McKinney and the surrounding cities. All children and parents, regardless of physical or cognitive capabilities, need a safe, while challenging, place to play in a park-like setting. This, therefore, includes all socio-economic groups, and spans ages from preschool to the elderly as our target audience. Our ultimate goal is to continue to raise funds for the All-Abilities Playground until the Park's and Open Spaces Department requires payment. Rotary International poses a question "Is it beneficial to all concern?" as part of its ethics code, and we know this All-Abilities Playground will be a positive testament to this question.

• Describe how the proposed Project fulfills strategic goals and objectives for your organization.

The primary goal of our Rotary Clubs (Foundation) is humanitarian in nature. Internationally, Rotary has striven to eradicate polio and has almost succeeded. In McKinney, the goal is to improve the quality of life for all who live here. Elementary through high school children have been our concentration, with assistance for necessities, leadership training, health improving opportunities and scholarships. This project has a same goal and objective, with an underserved cohort: children with special needs and their families. It is the Rotary's view that children learn about the world through play, build self-esteem through successful play, develop social acuity through diverse play, and develop into strong citizens through inclusive play and challenges overcome. This All-Abilities Playground will provide the venue and opportunity for children to experience the freedom, choices and results to all the above. In addition, empathy and acceptance of others will be an important result of able bodied children and children with special needs looking beyond differences as they play side by side. The goals and objectives are simple and acutely in tune with Rotary values: Make life better for children and families who are underserved within McKinney; improving their quality of life.

We are continuing to raise funds with small events which do not require a lot of lead time, and will do so as long as the Park Department's timeline allows. (1) "Soft" Groundbreaking for All-Abilities Playground proposed for April 20th with approximately 100 invited. Announce continuing fundraising efforts. (2) Auction with Rotary members and friends in early April for approximately 50. (3) Garage Sale at Stonebridge UMC on April 29th with approximately 100 - 200 attending. (4) Jeweler/realtor event with raffle of diamond "key" necklace. Approximately 30 -50 attending @ \$25.00 - \$50.00 per ticket. Under discussion for other events.

• Include the venue/location for Project?

The venue for the All-Abilities Playground is a site within the northwest area of Bonnie Wenk Park. The site is near the intersection of Hardin Blvd. and Virginia Parkway. The area is northwest of the dog park and north of the adjacent parking lot.

Provide a timeline for the Project.

The Parks Department is "keeper" of the timeline and the Rotary has been told the construction will probably begin in late April 2017. The anticipated completion of Phase II (of which the playground is a part) is spring 2018. As to when the funds will be required, we anticipate partial payments due in early summer, but have no specific date.

Detail goals for growth/expansion in future years.

The Parks Department will assume all responsibilities and maintenance of the All-Abilities Playground upon completion as a part of their system. In discussions between the Rotary Clubs and the Parks Department, there is a clear understanding that the playground will be maintained by the City of McKinney. The Rotary Club Foundation's view is to create a "legacy playground". If that translates into playground growth and expansion, the Rotary Clubs of McKinney's' "vision" will be fulfilled. Our agreement includes only the initial construction.

Has a feasibility study or market analysis been completed for this proposed project? If so, please attach a copy of the Executive Summary.

Bonnie Wenk already had a standard playground included in Phase II. After reviewing all the 43 playgrounds in McKinney, it became clear there needed to at least one which would address the accessibility and "playability" of children with special needs and disabled adult parents.

Provide specific information to illustrate how this Project aligns with one or more of the goals and strategies adopted by McKinney City Council and McKinney Community Development:

The All-Abilities Playground exemplifies basic "quality of life" improvements for all children, with an emphasis on children with special needs and their families. Although "quality of life" often refers to one's health, in reference to the All-Abilities Playground, it refers to a child with special needs, having the same opportunity to maximize the choices and opportunities as all other children. For their families, "quality of life" can mean having a place to recreate where they don't have to explain behavior and can enjoy an afternoon in the park as other families. Children and families from McKinney and adjoining cities will be attracted to a playground in which accessibility and play with specially-designed equipment accommodating their wheelchairs and other durable medical equipment is a primary focus. It may be the first time they and their parents can enter a playground designed for access, safety and freedom of choice. Included in the design are areas for children who need to play "alone" in a quiet place, or those who are "sensory seekers" with equipment designed for tactile experiences. Children with special needs seldom have the "choices" the general population takes for granted.

The partnership of the City of McKinney's Parks Department, the two Rotary Clubs (Foundation), and the designer has worked diligently to include as many opportunities for easy access and "playable equipment". This model was to make this a "destination playground". The city and parks department have upgraded the infrastructure of all the adjacent areas including a larger parking area to accommodate buses (field trips), additional road access from the north and west, a restroom with a "family space" for parents who need to enter the restrooms with their children and wider trails. The Rotary Clubs, while raising the funding, have researched equipment, costs, spoken with parents and kept the project "on target with the final goal of having it remaining focused as a play area for those children who are unable to participate in the other recreational facilities in McKinney. Finally, sustainability has always been at the forefront of this project The city of McKinney (Parks Department) will assume maintenance and liability for the playground upon completion.

The All-Abilities Playground is eligible for consideration under Sections 501 – 506 of the Texas Local Government

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Code and will address the goals to:

- Support <u>fitness</u> to the fullest extent of each child's abilities with focus on children with special needs, while including equipment with a "playability" for all children.
- <u>Promote</u> the site as a "destination playground" within McKinney, Collin County and the Metroplex.
- <u>Contribute</u> to "<u>quality of life</u>", on many levels, as individuals and as families. This also applies to adults with disabilities who want to recreate with their children in a park atmosphere.
- <u>Sustain</u> the All-Abilities Playground through an agreement with the City of McKinney to maintain the playground upon completion.

The proposed project aligns with several of the MCDC goals and strategies:

- 1. Creating an All Abilities Playground project significantly contributes to the quality of life for the special needs adults and children in McKinney, Texas and in Collin County.
- 2. The All Abilities Playground project highlights and promotes McKinney, Texas as a community that addresses the needs of all citizens (special needs and non-special needs).
- 3. All Abilities Playground project committee members have collaborated with the City of McKinney to ensure the sustainability of the project. The City of McKinney will maintain and sustain the project.
- 4. All Abilities Playground project meets citizen needs for quality of life improvements by supporting the 2012 American Disabilities Act.

Financial

 Provide an overview of the organization's financial status including the impact of this grant request on organization mission and goals.

Due to the partnership of the two McKinney Rotary Clubs, a separate All-Abilities Playground bank account, with signatories from both clubs, was established. The McKinney Foundation's status has remained strong with their flag lease program, as is the Sunrise Rotary Club. The decision to enter into a project of this magnitude has been kept separate from the other on-going obligations and commitments such as scholarships, flag supplies, payment to the scouts for delivering flags and support, through the schools, for homeless students and students of families living at or below the poverty level in McKinney ISD. The combined Rotary Clubs' donation is \$74,607.00. This donation does not include those from individual members. This grant is requested to cover the shortfall we have today with the bid received 2/2/2017. The City Council approved acceptance of the bid on 2/21/2017. We will continue to raise funds if possible (possibly June) and any donations received for the construction will be applied to the shortfall; lowering the amount of our request.

Our marketing and outreach plans include a "groundbreaking" for the All-Abilities Playground on April 20th, highlighting the remaining funds left to raise to complete the construction. Due to the local nature of the All-Abilities Playground, our concentration for the next few months will be contacting and re-contacting local and county businesses, parents, and school PTOs. We are in the planning phase for several locallyhosted events. We will continue to make presentations to clubs and groups.


