Our County Now

- One of fastest-growing counties in Texas and U.S.
 - 60 new residents every day
- Sixth most populous Texas county
- 2017 population 970,000
- 2018/19 1 million
- Vehicle registrations continue to rise, hitting almost 900,000 in 2016




Our County's Growth So Far

Population Estimates and Projections, Metroplex Counties, 2010-2050















Mobility Plan 2014

The Collin County **Mobility Plan 2014** Update, Addendum 1 indicates that when the county is built out there will be widespread gridlock, level of service "F" (red on map)





Projected Traffic Volumes

When the traffic volume of a roadway exceeds 45,000 vehicles per day it needs to be converted to a freeway.

Projected volumes for US 380 and SH 78:

	<u>Today</u>	<u>2035</u>	Build-out
US 380 west of Custer	45,000	57,000	69,000
SH 78 west of SH 205	37,000	59,000	88,000







Economic Impact

Will new freeways have a negative impact due to loss in current business?

- No
- 2016 Perryman study; economic impact of a freeway vs 6-lane thoroughfare:
 - Net increase of \$19.4B in gross product
 - Net increase of 160,600 jobs

System Improvements

Partnership is required

- Collin County
- the Texas Dept of Transportation (TxDOT)
- the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO)
- the cities



Collin County's Share

Collin County is proposing a bond program to provide its share of the partnership for an improved transportation system.

- \$600,000,000 for non-tolled freeways
- \$140,000,000 for thoroughfares



County's New Freeways

New freeways are long-term (20-year) projects

- Set alignment
- Conduct environmental analysis
- Acquire ROW
- Design
- Adjust utilities
- Construct service roads
- Construct main lanes
- Not all segments are started at same time



Timeline For New Freeways

First Five Years: Pre-Construction Tasks

- Feasibility/Alignment/Environmental/Public involvement
- Design
- ROW purchase
- Utility relocation

Thoroughfares

Bond funding is needed to improve the capacity of major roadways that will be severely congested in the immediate future.

This funding will:

- support Collin County projects
- allow Collin County to partner with TxDOT, the MPO and the cities



Bond Program Timeline

2019-2023 Bond Program:

- Design and construction of thoroughfares
- Outer Loop (Preston US 75) construct service roads
- Pre-construction stages of freeways

Construction of freeways will occur after 2023

Open Space Development

Bond funding is needed for additional parks and open space in cities

- Collin County has partnered with cities for decades
- Preserves key natural resources as land is converted to homes and businesses.
