As we discussed on our application and in our presentation – the signage and fencing at Chestnut Square was dated (in a bad way), in poor condition and difficult to maintain. The completion of the Davis at the Square complex and the Playful Headquarters challenged us to upgrade our property aesthetics – as well as create more defined boundaries, and provide a more secure environment for our staff, visitors and guests.

We first gathered a team of stakeholders – neighbors, past board members and community leaders – to identify the needs, collaborate on the "look" and communicate to others the value of the improvements. It's a daunting task to consider a major change to a treasured landmark like Chestnut Square. Working with our 2017-2018 board members, we tweaked the "public" name of Chestnut Square Historic Village to Heritage Village at chestnut Square – and in 2018 rolled out the new logo depicting the Dulaney House. (designed gratuitously by Adam Pagano, board member). Once that was complete, we got to work on the sign & fence designs. City staff Guy Giersch, Barry Shelton, Jeff Harris and met with us multiple times to ensure our plans were within the city guidelines and permits would be approved. We were informed we needed an updated survey which was ordered in July but not completed until Dec 31, 2018! In the meantime, site surveys were completed for the sign permits.

The property survey revealed an encroachment which we petitioned the city to grant us — which they fortunately did in March, after yet another survey of just the encroachment. At the same time, steel prices were fluctuating daily — we finally made the decision to purchase some in May — unsure of whether or not it was prudent — but the tariffs ended up affecting the cost by a few thousand dollars.

Demolition of the old fencing and signage progressed throughout the spring. We offered useable pieces to the community – a house on Church Street repurposed some 80' of 3' picket fencing and several pieces of the lattice fencing were taken – saving us some labor and dump fees! The entire demolition was performed by volunteers, those savings are counted as part of the \$9,000 share of HGCC costs.

In July the first (raw) signs were delivered and prep work began on the sites. Concrete bases were formed and poured. Powder coating took about 2 months — and in August the first towers were installed. All 8 signs, including the 2 large ones on Hwy 5 — were completely installed by September, and the final prep for the fencing was completed. Hedges and fence posts had to be removed, and cement bases had to be excavated.

The new fencing was installed in October and November – the 6' sections first, then the shorter sections along Chestnut and Anthony Streets. When we engaged the fence provider they knew that we may have had to install in stages based on costs. But they came up with a much less expensive gate system and also were able to use some 30' of donated fencing that is not only historic and period appropriate but also fits in very well with the aesthetics.

Goals and Objectives

All of our visions for this project are coming to life! The property looks cleaner and better maintained, the boundaries are more defined, the buildings along Hwy 5 are better protected and the visibility is so

much improved on both sides of the fence! In fact, the City has selected Chestnut Square to house one of the Arts Commission/Cultural District butterfly sculptures!

We were given \$1000 by the Garden Club of McKinney for additional landscaping work, and the GHCC portion of the project included all of the demolition and disposal of old fencing and sign materials (one of the signs is now part of a new animal feed storage container), some engineering work that was donated and all of the permit fees were also donated.

Success

Our only measure of success is stakeholder and community response – and by all accounts it is a huge success! We hope you are as proud of this project as we are. It is wonderful for all of us to show off this beautiful upgrade – so much more visible and interesting than talking about new siding, a roof or foundation work!







A New Era for an Historic Village Nov 20, 2019

Community leaders, historic neighborhood representatives and Heritage Guild members and directors, Chestnut Square employees and volunteers gathered to celebrate a two year project which resulted in a new public name, new logo, monument signage and wrought iron fence structures surrounding 75% of the 2 acre property.

An advisory committee was formed to offer historical perspective and input, qualify the design elements, and work together to produce the most significant change to the Chestnut Square campus in over 20 years.

Last year, work began on a new logo, incorporating the organizational name (Heritage Guild of Collin County) and the museum property name Chestnut Square, and the mission of Preservation, Celebration and Education. Once the name was crafted, work began on the logo, which was adopted in November 2018.

Meanwhile, site preparation was underway for the monument signage, and once the logo was adopted, fabrication of the signs began. From concept to fabrication to installation, the sign component was a year long endeavor. Once the signs were erected, the fencing followed. 20 year old wood lattice fencing was removed, and powder coated wrought iron fencing was mounted, designed to connect new components with the original fencing along Chestnut Street.

"This project will endure beyond our lifetimes" said Jaymie Pedigo, Executive Director, "so it was important that we get it right. It sets a more formal and inclusive tone for the property, and lends itself to a more dignified aesthetic and protection for our most cherished historic structures.
