Tapered service transition between Waste Connections and Frontier started in July

Provisions for all equipment and personnel completed




#### **Facilities**

# **Route Changes**




Approximately 15,791 residential properties will change their garbage pickup day to rebalance the routes as portions of the community grow and others stay the same

### **CBD Trash Services**

- Current Operations:
  - Four centralized dumpster locations
  - 70 carts, 95-gallons each
  - Trash is picked up six days per week
  - Businesses pay
     Waste Connections
     Directly



### **CBD Trash Finances**

- Currently 69 accounts (out of 180+) in the CBD pay approximately \$62,000 per year
- Latest Solid Waste Rate Study estimates that the cost of service for CBD is \$850,000 per year (\$788,000 subsidy by other rate payers)

### Isolated Cost of Service Rate Model

Each customer class is assigned respective costs



### Shared Cost of Service of Rate Model

CBD costs are shared across commercial businesses as follows:

Year 1: All CBD Business pay for service at current rates

Year 2: 25% of CBD costs paid by CBD businesses

Year 3,4,5: 50% of CBD costs assigned to CBD businesses



### Averaged Shared Cost of Service of Rate Model

Same as B, except rates are averaged over 5 years



- Solid waste fees will be included on water bill
- Total fee will be based on businesses associated with water bill
- Clarify door side collection assistance for disabled residents
- Updates for current practices and industry standards


#### **CBD Boundaries**

#### **Target Fund Balance:**


- 90-day operating reserve Cart replacement cost requirements based on a 7-year cart useful life

#### **Cart Replacement:**

- Money set aside for cart replacement counted as an expense
- Savings for cart replacement added back into in the Ending Fund Balance

#### **CBD Cost Service Breakdown**



- High level of service for downtown enclosures and carts requires additional personnel and equipment beyond contracted services
  - Cost in FY 2025 are approximately \$850,000 and increase to \$1.1 million in FY 2029
  - Historically, 50 business or fewer have paid for trash and recycling services in the downtown
    - Current customers generate \$62,550 in revenue per year
