PUBLIC WORKS SIDEWALK MAINTENANCE

- Sidewalks repairs are resident complaint driven
 - 250+ repair requests annually
 - 2/3 of street repair requests are for sidewalks
- Prioritization based on city's Sidewalk Maintenance Policy
 - -First come, first served
 - Nature and severity of issues (separation, cross slopes, holes, etc.)
 - -Location and amount of pedestrian traffic
 - Proximity of other streets or sidewalks repair projects







CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

- Improvement includes:
 - Sidewalks, curb ramps, driveways, intersection
 - May be combined with other infrastructure improvements or be developed as a standalone sidewalk improvement project.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (Contd.)

- Sidewalk improvements occur during:
 - Construction of new roadways
 - · Reconstruction of existing roadways







SIDEWALK IMPROVEMENT – DEVELOPER

- As required by the Engineering Design Manual for construction of public right-of-way improvements adjacent to development.
- Help in filling gaps in sidewalk network







EXISTING SIDEWALK NETWORK 995 miles of existing sidewalk


MISSING SIDEWALK NETWORK







SIDEWALKS CONSTRUCTION – PLANNED/UNDERWAY








SIDEWALK PROGRAM PRIORITIZATION

- Identifies sidewalk priority or pedestrian attraction areas based on **Council Goal 5F**.
 - Within ¼ mile from:
 - Schools
 - Parks and Civic facilities
 - Health care providers
 - Commercial areas
 - Additional criteria:
 - Low-income housing
 - Large employers
 - Street functional classifications





PEDESTRIAN ATTRACTION HEAT MAP










SIDEWALK PRIORITIZATION

CURRENT FUNDING & FUTURE CONSIDERATIONS

Group	Current Annual Funding	Source
Maintenance and Repair	\$300 k	General Fund
Accessibility Improvement	\$500 k	ADA Fund

- Annual sidewalk improvement rate (new or replacement) from city projects:
 ~3.5 miles/year
- CIP Program projects
 - Virginia Street and Louisiana Street Sidewalk Accessibility Improvements -
 - 2.6 miles of sidewalk \$1.7M \$650K/mile
 - Pine Street and Griffin Street Reconstruction -
 - .3 miles of sidewalk \$70,000 \$230K/mile
- New sidewalks can be installed by:
 - · City as part of street reconstruction
 - Developer as part of adjacent development activities
- · Safe Routes to School Program





SIDEWALK IMPROVEMENT CHALLENGES




- Areas of Limited Right-of-Way
 - Requires city-initiated ROW acquisitions (not always supported).
 - Can be costly for long corridors.



- May require removal of mature trees / landscaping in the ROW (not always supported).
- May disrupt character of established neighborhoods.





- Can add a significant cost to projects.
- Conflicts with Franchise Utilities

 Typically requires long lead time to relocate and may require additional ROW



SIDEWALK IMPROVEMENT CHALLENGES (Contd.)





- Peachtree Lane
 - Resident opposition for placing sidewalks due to mature trees





KEY TAKEWAYS

- The city has 995 miles of sidewalks, but we still have about 51.5 miles of streets without sidewalks on either side.
- New sidewalk installation is challenging in downtown areas, due to limited ROW, issues with grading, mature landscape, conflict with Franchise utilities.
- Standalone sidewalk installation projects are more challenging and less efficient, and it is better to address sidewalk gaps along with street or combined reconstruction projects.
